## Advocacy Ministries at CCPC

CCPC is currently expanding its advocacy efforts to increase the church's impact on issues of justice, draw additional members of the congregation into our mission work, and perhaps set the stage for increasingly ambitious social justice initiatives in the future. This increasing advocacy work is currently occurring in four areas of CCPC's mission work, all of which would benefit greatly from additional volunteer help and leadership.

- **THE REENTRY TASK FORCE** -- Building on its experience helping ex-offenders through the Transition Assistance Program (TAP), CCPC took the lead in creating what is now a citywide advocacy Task Force involving churches, nonprofits, the Public Defender's Office and others in advocating for fair treatment and greater opportunities for people who face many obstacles as they leave prison and reenter society, seek jobs, housing, and essential services. More volunteers with public policy, legal and other advocacy skills are needed, as well as a person with communication, web, and social networking skills. - **WASHINGTON INTERFAITH NEIGHBORS (WIN)**-- Chevy Chase Church recently joined WIN, an organization we have supported for many years. This brings us into alliance with more than two dozen DC congregations in an interfaith effort to address major issues of education, housing, job training and social services in the City of Washington through a process of community organizing and coalition-building. We are beginning a systematic process of outreach to CCPC members with the goal of involving a growing number of people in this interfaith effort.
